3rd Call for Papers

YOU ARE INVITED: 2nd Gender & STEM Network Conference Gender and STEM: What schools, families, and workplaces can do? 3–5 July 2014, Technische Universität Berlin, Germany

The first conference in 2012 focused on individual gendered pathways towards (and away from) STEM fields (STEM = **S**cience, **T**echnology, **E**ngineering, **M**athematics). In 2014, we highlight the roles of schools, families and workplaces for supporting or constraining girls/women and boys/men to choose and persist in STEM, versus other pathways.

This conference aims to present empirical research and educational policies, concerning how individual and social aspects impact individuals' motivation, attitudes, performance, educational and career choices and pathways into STEM fields. Complementary perspectives will address how such pathways can be facilitated at various points along students' and young adults' educational and occupational development.

The planned conference is an initiative of the Gender & STEM Network: <u>www.genderandstem.com</u> Members of the network share the following **objectives**:

- to gain more insight into the various connected aspects of career choices and professional careers of girls/women (and boys/men) in the direction of STEM;
- to detect new approaches to actually improve the underrepresentation of girls/women in STEM.

An important aim of this conference is to further extend the interdisciplinary collaboration of educational and psychological researchers, to move beyond results which highlight single aspects. Implications for educational and vocational training and practice will be discussed.

CONFERENCE

The **deadline** for submission of proposals, consisting of an abstract (400 words or less) and short bio statement of up to 100 words, is **January 30, 2014**. Information about acceptance will be sent out by **February 20, 2014**. Registration will commence following proposal acceptances. The deadline for early registration is **March 1, 2014**. Proposal submissions are now open, for the conference presentation formats below.

Conference Formats:

- *Symposia*: themed set of linked individual 4-5 papers.
- Individual Paper Presentation: to disseminate completed studies and ensuing implications.
- Posters: to provide the opportunity to interactively discuss research findings. A poster prize will be awarded to
 the three best posters by students / early career researchers (PhD within last 5 years), selected by a
 committee of international researchers.
- *Roundtables*: to facilitate the in-depth discussion of research projects in development.
- Workshops: to provide workshops on applied aspects of STEM education and induction.
- "*Make a Pitch":* a new format to allow researchers to search out inter/national collaborations by presenting a proposal pitch.
